Fall 2017 Undergraduate Courses in German (updated)

- Students who complete 101, 102, or 203 should continue to the next course in the sequence, that is, 102, 203, or 204.

- Students who have completed 204 with a grade of C or better are eligible to take any one of the following “2xx” courses:

- 258 Intermediate German: Reading

- 262 Intermediate German: Writing

- 249 Intermediate German: Speaking and Listening

- 274 Introduction to German Literature (6 cr.) (= 284 if enrolled for Honors)

Note that a total of nine credits of coursework at this level is required for the certificate, as prerequisites for the major, or to be able to advance to the 300-level. Students may take either (a) 249, 258, and 262; or (b) 274/284 and 249. 274 (honors number 284) is an intensive, 6- credit course that counts as the equivalent of 258 and 262. Unlike 101–204, 2xx courses may be taken in any order and simultaneously.

- Students who complete 9 credits of 2xx are eligible to take any of the following courses:

- 305 Literatur des 20. und 21. Jahrhunderts (= 385 if enrolled for Honors)

- 337 Advanced Composition and Conversation [H]

- 351 Introduction to German Linguistics [H]

- 372 (Lec. 001) Deutscher Film und deutsche Kultur [H]

- 372 (Lec. 003) China aus deutscher Sicht [H]

- 372 (Lec. 004) Luther und die Reformation [H]

All these courses are taught in German and therefore count toward the Certificate in German. 337 is required for the major and may also be repeated once for credit when taken abroad. 362 and 372 are repeatable when topics vary.

- The following additional course is open to students who have the prerequisites listed in parentheses. Any questions about prerequisites should be directed to the instructor.

- 612 German Literary Movements since 1750 (305 or c/i)

- 650 History of the German Language (351 and c/i)

- 676 Migration, Exil, Asyl: Texte und Kontexte (337 + 2 additional advanced-level GER courses; = 683 if enrolled for honors)

650 is taught in English and may be counted as a cognate course toward the German major. 676 fulfills the senior capstone requirement for the German major and is taught in German.

- All students may take the following courses:

- 236 From Gutenberg to the iPad: Books/World/Literature

- 267 Yiddish Song and the Jewish Experience [Ethnic Studies, Comm B option available]

- 269 Yiddish Literature and Culture in Europe

- Lit Trans 247 Dead Yiddish Poets Society

- Lit Trans 270 German Women Writers in Translation

These courses are taught in English and may count toward the major as cognate courses; majors are permitted to take up to 9 credits of cognate courses, which are German- or European-studies-themed courses taught in English.

Notes: “[H]” = “course may be taken for Honors”; “c/i” = “consent of instructor”
