1. *The Conceptualist Pharmacy in a Time of Transition: The Art of Inspection "Medical Hermeneutics"* (provisional title). The first book-length study of the Moscow Conceptualist art group Inspection "Medical Hermeneutics." Examining works across a range of genres and media—including tape-recorded discussions, inspections, performances, installations, political commentary, and fiction—the project traces the group's response to the collapse of the Soviet Union and Russia's turbulent transition to capitalism. At its center is the group's elaboration of a discursive pharmacology organized around metaphors of collective embodiment, which I examine through the lenses of political theology, biopolitics, and political semiosis.
